#### Rest in Jesus

I don't know about you, but for me, the last couple weeks have been heavy. While I certainly have had plenty to do what with the beginning of the school year, a couple weddings, several baptisms, and a handful of funerals, I have nevertheless found my thoughts wandering more and more to the condition of the world and the state of our great country. It feels as though we are very much broken and divided.

On September 10<sup>th</sup>, there was another school shooting. This time it was back in Colorado. A high school student walked into school one day and opened fire, critically injuring two classmates and then taking his own life. The shooters weapon and tactical gear that he possessed were covered in neo-nazi slogans and symbols.

On the very same day, September 10<sup>th</sup>, popular conservative Christian speaker Charlie Kirk was assassinated at a college event in Utah where he was scheduled to speak to and debate people with differing social and political points of view. On the shooter's shell casings, were written far-left antifa slogans and references.

Deadly attacks on the innocent from radical madmen on both ends of the political spectrum. On the same day, the eve of September 11<sup>th</sup>; which is a date that, in itself, carries its own infamy in the history of our country. Heavy, heavy stuff.

All that being said, it is clear that people from all walks of life and viewpoints in our culture are searching. They are searching for acceptance, purpose and direction.



There is a giant void in the center of our human existence that only a relationship with Jesus can fill. But, unfortunately, we as a culture have been quite adept at offering counterfeit things to fill that void. And it seems that the traditional cultural counterfeits: money, possessions, sex, power, and fame are more and more including identity claims, which stand in opposition to objective reality, and violence. It seems like the rationale is that if I can hurt or harm those who oppose me idealistically, this will somehow make a difference.



Like I said, heavy, heavy stuff. Dark stuff. In John 16, Jesus warns His disciples of times like this. Before He was arrested, Jesus says: "Behold, an hour is coming, and has *already* come, for you to be scattered, each to his own *home*, and to leave Me alone; and *yet* I am not alone, because the Father is with Me. "These things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you have tribulation, but take courage; I have overcome the world."

Yes, there will be trouble and much darkness in the world. But Jesus gives us THE thing, really THE ONLY thing to fill the void. Himself. Jesus says "in Me you may have peace." Peace and purpose, acceptance and direction can be found in this broken and dark world in the death and resurrection of our


Lord Jesus Christ. And truly, only in Christ and His promise of restoration and renewal in the New Creation to come can we have true peace.

So when we face heavy and dark stuff, and there certainly will be more to come, it would behoove us to listen to the voice of Jesus when He says, "take courage". This is exactly what we must do. Take heart, take courage and let the brokenness and darkness of this world that so often descends upon us remind you at this is NOT all there is for us. God has so so much in store for us in the life to come. But until that day arrives, know that Jesus has got this. He has already overcome sin, death and the power of the devil. ### Is God Calling You Foolish?

In the Parable of the Rich Fool (Luke 12:13-21), Jesus taught a lesson about the importance of acknowledging God's ownership of our possessions and the damaging effects of being greedy for more. In the parable, Jesus told about a successful farmer who had so much excess grain that he decided to tear down his existing barns to build bigger ones so he would have a place to store it. His sin was not in protecting his investment by building bigger barns. He sinned in his failure to acknowledge God as the provider and owner of all that he had, his indifference

to those in need around him, and his greed for more. Because he placed his trust in himself and his possessions instead of God, Jesus called him a "fool." His life was centered only on himself.

The Rich Fool never discovered the real meaning of life. Jesus said, "For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world, and forfeit his soul?" (Mark 8:36). The Rich Fool saw his wealth as his own and didn't acknowledge God. He lost all his wealth, which was the focus of his life, and forfeited his soul as well.

In our own lives, are we building bigger barns so that God is calling us fools? Our "barns" may not store grain; they might hold our luxury cars, the mansions we live in, the retirement accounts we're funding. Regardless of what it is we hold dear, if we fail to acknowledge that God is the owner and in control of our lives and if worldly pursuits have become overly important, the label of "fool" is applicable to us. We may not be as rich as the Rich Fool, but we can still be fools.





#### **Seeking Prayer Angels for our Trinity Classes**
